

Target Influenza Immunisation Schedule

BEFORE ADMINISTERING A FLU VACCINE, CHECK YOU HAVE THE CORRECT VACCINE FOR THE PERSON'S AGE

AGE		VACCINE BRANDS
6 months - <3 years (ALL children)	NEW	FluQuadri Junior
3 - <5 years (ALL children)	NEW	FluQuadri or Fluarix Tetra
5 - 9 years *at increased risk of complications from severe influenza infections		Fluarix Tetra or FluQuadri
Children aged 6 mths to <9 yrs receiving Influenza Vaccine for the first time require 2 doses 4 weeks apart. Only one dose is required in subsequent years.		
10 - 64 years *at increased risk of complications from severe influenza infections		FluQuadri or Fluarix Tetra or Afluria Quad (over 18 yrs only)
Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 15 years - 64 years		FluQuadri or Fluarix Tetra or Afluria Quad (over 18 yrs only)
Pregnant women (in any trimester)		FluQuadri or Fluarix Tetra or Afluria Quad (over 18 yrs only)
65 years and over	NEW	Fluzone High Dose or Fluad

*Conditions predisposing to severe influenza include the following:

Cardiac disease: Cyanotic congenital heart disease, coronary artery disease, congestive heart failure

Chronic respiratory conditions: Suppurative lung disease, bronchiectasis, cystic fibrosis, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, chronic emphysema

Severe asthma defined as requiring frequent hospital visits and the use of multiple medications

Other chronic illnesses requiring regular medical follow-up or hospitalisation in the previous year: Diabetes mellitus, chronic metabolic diseases, chronic renal failure, haemoglobulinopathies, impaired immunity (including drug induced immune impairment)

Chronic neurological conditions that can compromise respiratory function: Multiple sclerosis, spinal cord injury, seizure disorder, other neurological conditions

People with impaired immunity: HIV infection, malignancy, chronic steroid use, asplenia or splenic dysfunction

Long-term aspirin therapy in children aged 6 months - 10 years

Influenza vaccine is also strongly recommended, but not funded, for other groups of people.
