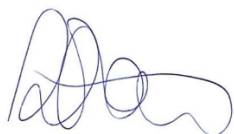

Q1. *Why do shovel ready community backed projects get rejected by the administration or some within council? Two of which were Howells Hill lookout and spring streetscaping.*

#### Response from Chief Executive Officer

All development applications are assessed in accordance with the Tasmanian Planning Scheme and Local Provisions Schedule of Glamorgan Spring Bay. Projects that receive planning approval may never eventuate, and there are many reasons for that, but ultimately decision to progress (or not) is a matter for property owners, not Council unless Council is the asset owner and permit holder.

#### Question 1

*Will Glamorgan Spring Bay Council be undertaking Bushfire Mitigation works with the engagement of Ground Proof Mapping/or others, to complete the GSBC Bushfire Mitigation plan in its entirety, this Autumn/Winter of 2026?*

*Large areas of these reserves have had no bushfire management/fuel reduction for well over 40yrs, even though, on council’s website, the Coles Bay Reserves Fire Management Plan, dated June 2015, have areas highlighted to have fuel reduction burns completed.*

A. Council management will recommend that the 2026/27 Council budget includes the fuel break fire management works recommended in the GPM report of July 2025 for the Harold Street and Rita & Doris Reserves.

Q2.

Question 2

*Can council supply highlighted plan/areas where the Coles Bay Reserves Fire Management Plan has had fuel reduction works completed since 2015 to current?*

*Currently Emergency Service personnel would not be able to safely walk around the perimeter of these Reserves due to fallen trees, weeds, and excessive/dead undergrowth.*

*In a bushfire Emergency, Fire and Emergency vehicles have no access to supply protection to properties adjoining these reserves, let alone the remainder of the township of Coles Bay.*

A. The fuel breaks have been mulched in the Rita and Doris Reserve and from the Brooker Street road reservation to Cosgrove Street in the Harold Street Reserve. A contractor will be engaged to slash these breaks in the next few weeks.

#### **BACKGROUND/OVERVIEW**

The financial reports for the period ending 31 January 2026 (as attached to this report) are presented for the information of Council.

The first report of the attachments is the Capital Works Program (**CAPEX**) for the 2025/2026 Financial Year.

The report details that Council has budgeted to spend just over \$9M in Capital Works for the 2025/2026 Financial Year.

The major components of the program are Roads, Footpaths and Kerbs (38%), Parks, Reserves, Walking Tracks and Cemeteries (17%), Buildings (15%) and Plant Equipment and Other (14%).

As at 31 January 2026 Council has spent 41% of the revised budget for the 2025/2026 Financial Year (\$3,714,946/\$9,076,947).

Based on the budget year being for 12 months, Council is 59% of the way through the Financial Year.

The second report of the attachments is the Profit and Loss Statement as at 31 January 2026. This details that the Year-to-Date Actuals are \$2.2M in front of the Year-to-Date Budget.

The third report of the attachments is the Statement of Financial Position (Balance Sheet) as at 31 January 2026. This report details that the Net Assets are \$267M as at 31 January 2026 (\$262M as at 30 June 2025).

The final report of the attachments is the Statement of Cashflows as at 31 January 2026. This report details a net change in cash of \$972K from 30 June 2025 (\$12.7M) to \$13.7M as at 31 January 2026. This is an increase of \$1M or 8%.

#### **PURPOSE**

This report provides information on the ongoing tasks of the Department in relation to Governance, Human Resources, Work Health and Safety, Economic Development, Community Development.

#### **OFFICER'S COMMENTS**

Officers commenced a review of the format (and content) of the Ordinary Council Meeting agenda for the purpose of satisfying legislative requirements and to identify how information sharing between Executive and Councillors can be streamlined/improved. A revised format will be presented at the March Workshop with a view to introduce a new agenda format at the March OCM.

#### **COMMUNICATIONS AND MEDIA**

Council's Facebook page continues to be the most effective platform for community communication, supported by regularly updated municipal noticeboards.

#### **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

The Community Development Team has maintained a high level of engagement over the past month, delivering a range of activities across community recovery, events, stakeholder liaison and communications. Ongoing collaboration with Recovery and Resilience Tasmania remains a key focus.

#### **Recovery and Community Engagement**

- Council has continued to attend regular meetings relating to recovery and emergency management processes, including participation in the Dolphin Sands Cleanup Program Advisory Group. Council has also met with members of the Dolphin Sands community on several occasions. During the current recovery phase, the primary focus remains on maintaining strong relationships with community members and ensuring clear, consistent communication.
- As part of Council's commitment to the Dolphin Sands recovery process and in support of Swansea residents, Council has worked each Thursday from the East Coast Tourism Office at the Swansea Courthouse. This presence has provided a valuable opportunity for residents to raise Council-related matters locally and has strengthened the conduit between the community and Council staff.

- Council has also commenced regular dialogue with a mainland-based recovery mentor. This free service, facilitated by the State Government and the Red Cross is of high value. Mentoring will continue over the next twelve months. The expertise provided includes:
  - Local and State Government recovery processes
  - Development and implementation of Community Recovery Plans
  - Short- and long-term recovery planning and sustainability
  - Community-led recovery approaches
  - Recovery tools and frameworks

### **Events and Community Partnerships**

- The Australia Day Awards and Citizenship Ceremony was held on Thursday 22 January 2026. The event was well attended and provided a meaningful celebration of volunteers and new citizens within the municipality. Significant planning and coordination were required, including liaison with the Department of Home Affairs to ensure all protocol requirements were met. The team delivered a professional and celebratory event, providing a fitting tribute to nominees and recipients.
- The Community Development Team also met with several organisations during the month, including Spoke Festival representatives, Tasmania Fire Service personnel and local community members, to discuss upcoming events and collaborative projects.

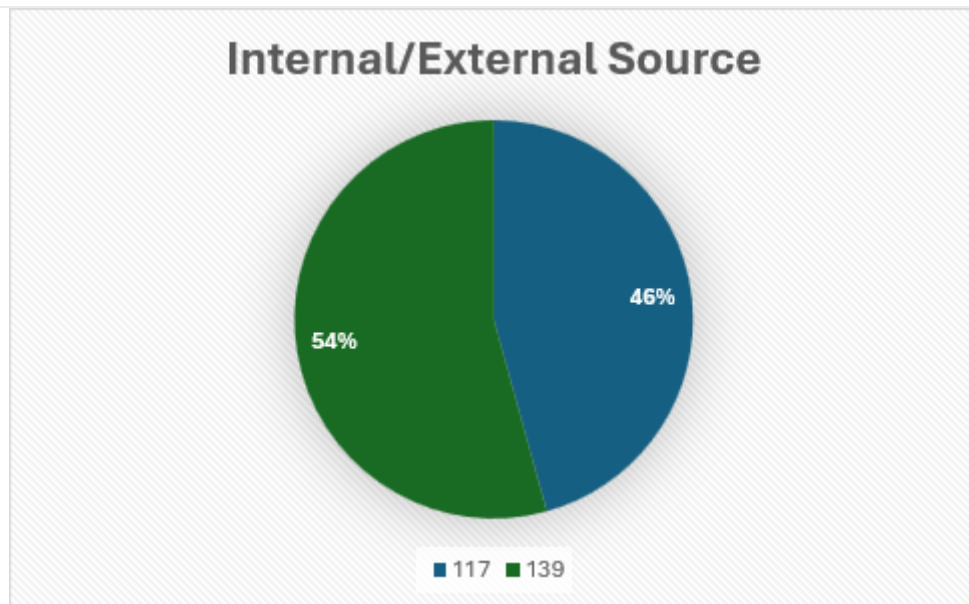
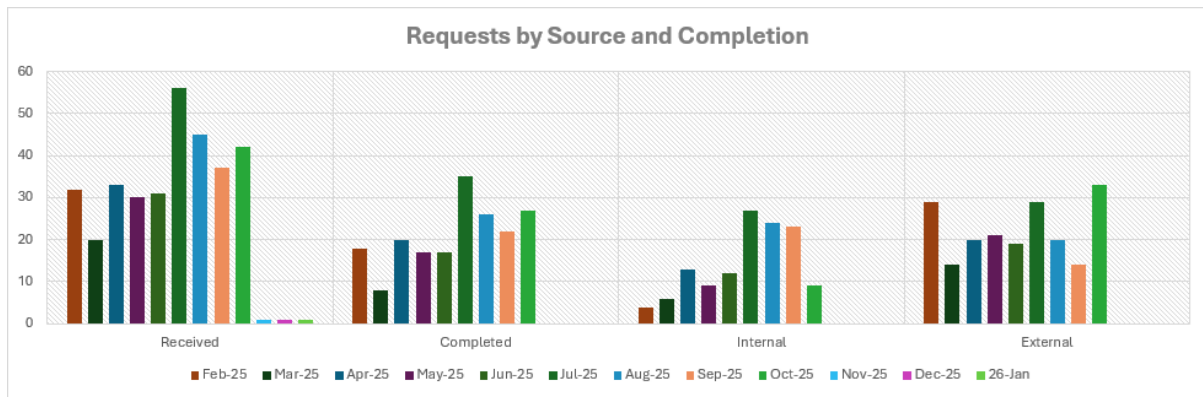

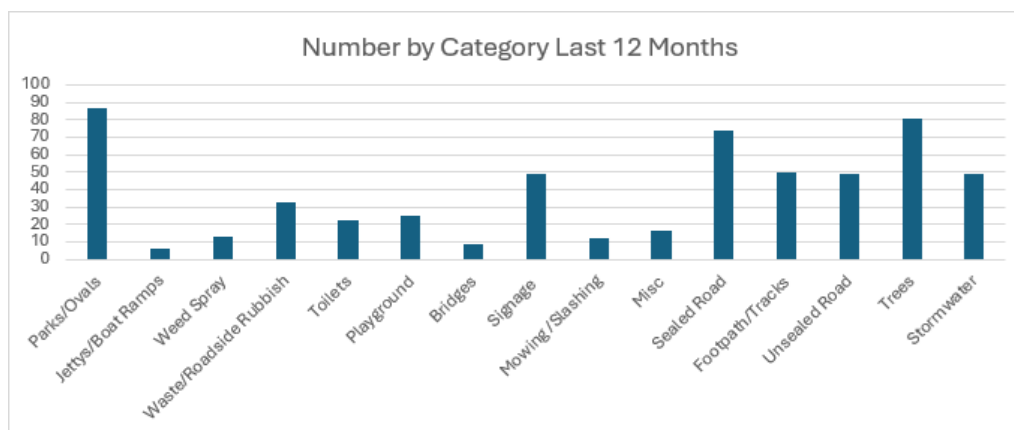

## CAPITAL WORKS

- Lions Park Playground, Bicheno – requests for quotations were called with prices for the works far exceeding expectations. The budget is significantly short and will require additional funds from Council. The designer that completed the concept designs has now been engaged to produce IFC drawings and tender documents for GSBC- January 26- drawings and scope received and being prepared for tendering

- Pavement Rehabilitation and Bitumen Reseal- 95% completed
- Wielangta Rd Bridge #55 upgrade - currently sourcing material quotes.
- Duck Park, Swansea exercise equipment - new exercise equipment ordered, 22-week lead time for delivery.
- 25/26 FY footpath replacement plan- no new scopes for January
- 25/26 FY KC replacement plan: no new scopes completed for January
- Morrison St, Bicheno. Kerb install at cul-de-sac (cemetery) and asphaltting – underway
- First stage of Nailer Ave, Bicheno works – underway
- Asphalt footpath to Bark Mill, Swansea - permit now approved by State Growth, boxing/edge materials ordered- planned for new year 2026
- Bicheno Skatepark toilet is at floor level, Slab has been ground, and sealed, concrete block walls are standing and core filled, the steel fabricators have been to measure up so works are progressing.
- Duck Park, Swansea replacement pedestrian bridge - GSBC development engineer in discussions with designers. The budget allocated for replacement will be well underfunded and will require further capital budget allocation- RFQ for design and construct, RFQ's received from 2 suppliers and extra funding requested for next financial year.
- Unsealed road re-sheet scopes and estimates approved for completion:
  1. Woodsden Rd, Buckland, 1.7km long- completed
  2. Oakhampton Rd, Triabunna, 1.2km long- Feb 2026
  3. Sand River Rd, Buckland, 1km long- completed

#### **BACKGROUND/OVERVIEW**

##### Animal Control and Compliance:

Draft Dog Management Policy 2024-2029 - Council has forwarded the Draft Policy to Parks and Wildlife Service (PWS), for their approval for the draft policy to be reported to Council for the draft policy to go on public exhibition.

For the reporting period 19 dogs were registered, totaling 967 dogs for the year.

Fire abatement inspections have continued to be undertaken within the Municipality.

##### Building and Plumbing:

For the reporting period: 1 Building Permit, 7 Approvals for Notifiable Building Works, 0 Low Risk Building approvals, 0 Certificates of Substantial Compliance, 0 Temporary Occupancy Permits, 4 Plumbing Permits, 7 Approvals for Notifiable Plumbing Works, 1 Low Risk Plumbing approvals, 1 Building & Plumbing Notices were issued, and 1 Building & Plumbing Orders were issued.

##### Environmental Health:

Routine inspections of food premises continue in line with the inspection frequency set by the statewide Food Business Risk Classification System, with advice and instruction provided to ensure compliance with the *Food Act 2003*.

A range of complaints regarding food premises, environmental nuisance/harm continue to be received and addressed on a case-by-case basis. Issues have included failing on-site wastewater systems, odour, general food handling practices and date marking of packaged food.

Publicly accessible pools and spas continue to be monitored on a monthly basis by owners/operators, while sampling of popular recreational beaches was conducted in January by Council Officers. All nine (9) beach samples complied with the threshold microbiological

values as provided by the *Recreational Water Quality Guidelines 2007* (the Guidelines). Sample results are published on Councils website. Sampling will continue during February and March as required under the Guidelines.

Plans for the upcoming Spoke Motorcycle Festival (27 Feb – 1 March) have been reviewed and assessed in accordance with the requirements of the *Public Health Act 1997*. While a Place of Assembly license is not required for this event a public health risk activity will be conducted (tattooing), with both the operator licenced and the premises from which they operate (stall/tent/gazebo) registered by Council, while food vendors must be registered in accordance with the *Food Act 2003*.

#### Planning:

For the January period 16 new development applications were received and 11 applications were approved.

Council has provided delegation to the General Manager to approve an application where no more than two representations are lodged against the application. No applications assessed during the period received 1-2 representations. There are currently no planning appeals in mediation.

#### Property:

Advertising has commenced for the vacant Property and Projects Officer position.

#### PURPOSE

To provide Council with a revised Capital Works Program (**CAPEX**) for the 2025/2026 Financial Year, as at February 2026 and request for Council to adopt the new revised CAPEX for the 2025/2026 Financial Year.

#### BACKGROUND/OVERVIEW

A workshop was held with Councillors on Tuesday 10 February 2026. This workshop was held to guide Councillors through the proposed amendments to the CAPEX for the 2025/2026 Financial Year. It is now proposed that the program will be increased by \$1.7M on the adopted budget for the 2025/2026 Financial Year (increased from \$7.3M to \$9M) as at February 2026.

The major increases to the program are as follows:

1. Triabunna Tomorrow Streetscapes – increase the revised budget from \$445K to 1.36M. The entire \$914K increase to this project is grant funded.
2. Duck Park Foot Bridge – increase the revised budget from \$100K to \$390K. The entire funding from this project will come from Council funds.
3. Playground at Bicheno Lions Park – increase the revised budget from \$90K to \$300K.

The funding sources for the \$1.7M increase to the program is detailed under the budget implications section of this report.

## **8.4 Review of the Southern Tasmanian Regional Land Use Strategy (STRLUS) - Council Submission**

### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this report is for the Council to consider a submission to the exhibition of the review of the draft *Southern Tasmanian Regional Land Use Strategy* (draft STRLUS).

### **BACKGROUND/OVERVIEW**

Regional Land Use Strategies were intended to provide a key task for setting priorities for the strategic delivery of land through the land use planning system in Tasmania. They were intended to provide a regional series of policies and strategies to enable growth and development from 2010 to 2035

The existing strategies for the south, north and northwest (Cradle Coast) regions were developed in the early 2010's and were used in the assessment of new planning schemes and local provisions schedules, amendments to planning schemes and local provisions schedules and various other planning processes such as major project or state project assessments.

For Glamorgan Spring Bay, the existing Southern Tasmanian Regional Land Use Strategy (STRLUS) was used by the Tasmanian Planning Commission to assess the draft Local Provisions Schedule and planning scheme amendments for the Cambria Green proposal, bushfire hazard overlays, changes to the Dolphin Sands Specific Area Plan, and specific amendment applications for the Tempus retirement lifestyle village at Swansea, changes to the Louisville Road Specific Area Plan and the Rheban Road subdivision.

The STRLUS provided a policy and strategy framework to manage and control growth across biodiversity and geodiversity, water resources, the coast, risk and hazards, cultural values, recreation and open space, social infrastructure, physical infrastructure, land use and transport integration, tourism, strategic economic opportunities, productive resources, industrial activity, activity centres, and settlement and regional development.

Operation of the STRLUS has been problematic across the region, resulting in a series of election commitments to review the existing document, which commenced in 2024 and was handed to the State in mid-2025. The current review was intended to be a collaborative project between the State and the region, to update settlement patterns, establish regional priorities and address implementation of the Tasmanian Planning Polices across the region.

The December 2025 Liberal 100-day plan committed to the consultation of the draft STRLUS.

The draft STRLUS were available from the [Shaping Tasmania](#) website, together with background information and the following supporting reports:

- Draft STRLUS Background Report;
- Response to STRLUS Consultation Feedback
- Statewide Industrial Land Strategy (available from 10 February 2026)
- Phase One Consultation Report
- State of Play Report
- State of Play Report Summary
- Southern Tasmanian Economic Profile

- Residential Demand and Supply Study Markey Demand Report.

Consultation on the draft STRLUS commenced in November 2025 and closed on 22 February 2026. Council obtained an extension of time to allow presentation of this report to the February 2026 Meeting for consideration.

### **STATUTORY IMPLICATIONS**

#### *Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993*

Regional Land Use Strategies are established at section 5A of the Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993 (LUPAA), which establishes the following requirements:

- 1, 2 the Minister for Planning may declare and notify regions (South, North, Cradle Coast).
- 3 Minister may notify the making of regional strategies.
- 3A Minister must receive advice from the Tasmanian Planning Commission and determine consistency with the Schedule 1 Objectives of the Act, State Policies and the Tasmanian Planning Policies.
- 4 Minister must consult with the Commission, planning authorities and State service authorities.
- 5 Strategies may incorporate documents relevant to application to municipal areas.
- 6 Minister must keep strategies under regular and periodic review.
- 7 requires reviews to be consistent with assessment criteria at 3A.
- 8 Minister must review the RLUS as soon as practicable after making of the Tasmanian Planning Policies to determine compliance.

The RLUS is applied under the Act through the following:

- Development, amendment, review and assessment of Local Provisions Schedules (sections 34 LPS Criteria, 35N criteria for review of LPS), and
- Assessment of Major Projects (Division 2A of the Act)

The STRLUS is one of ten assessment criteria under the LPS criteria established at section 34 of the Act. They are (summarised):

- (a) contains all the required SPP provisions in an LPS; and
- (b) is in accordance with section 32 (contents of an LPS); and
- (c) furthers the Schedule1 objectives of the Act; and
- (d) is consistent with State policies; and
- (da) satisfies the relevant criteria in the Tasmanian Planning Policies (34 policy areas, up to 254 policy statements); and
- (e) practicable consistency with the **regional land use strategy**; and
- (f) has regard to the Council strategic plan; and
- (g) is practicably consistent with any adjoining LPS's; and
- (h) is consistent with the safety requirements under the Gas Safety Act 2019.

The STRLUS is not and *cannot* be applied to the assessment of planning applications under the Tasmanian Planning Scheme, rather it is used to assess the planning schemes themselves.

## OFFICER'S COMMENTS

There is little debate about the need and ability for regional land use strategies to perform a significant role in planning for the future development of the region and more particularly, enabling the long term strategic planning for infrastructure and service delivery to ensure current and future Tasmanians have a safe and pleasant place to live and work, and enable the long term investments to deliver those outcomes.

The current review is the first since declaration of the STRLUS in 2010. It must be supported, particularly given the changes to the land use planning system, economy, the wider social and demographic changes, the cost of living and the housing availability/affordability crisis Tasmania is facing.

That said, support of the draft STRLUS must be questioned.

The draft STRLUS reads like a background document and does not provide the future vision, strategies or priorities that are required to deliver those outcomes across southern Tasmania. This appears to result from numerous factors:

- the supporting documents rely on historical data to determine future needs, which presumes that historical supply has met the required demand across a range of sectors;
- it does not recognise the well-established housing crisis, the commitments under the National Housing Accord, nor establish priorities or strategic initiatives to address these;
- the only future development strategies or scenarios provided are based on historical data, entrenching the existing status quo, and do not consider any external inputs of strategic initiatives, particularly around the future impacts of Tasmania as a lifestyle destination, climate change and broader needs to build a sustainable population base and age profile within the region and across the State;
- a long-term lack of integration of land use and strategic infrastructure investment, planning and delivery across successive governments; and
- a long-term failure by the State to properly resource and support strategic land use planning within Tasmania, and the lack of a clear shared vision to identify the future direction for Tasmania by the current and previous administrations.

The statutory functions of the STRLUS are set through the assessment criteria at section 5A and other sections of the Act as consistency with the Schedule 1 Objectives of the Act, State Policies and the recently made Tasmanian Planning Policies. It should play a critical role in delivering the future of the greater Hobart area and the southern region. It fails to do this, and as a result, is inconsistent with the Schedule 1 objectives of the Act.

The constrained process for development of the draft STRLUS impacted its development. A significant example of this is the late provision of the *Statewide Industrial Land Strategy*, despite clear statements that it was a supporting appendix for the consultation period (available from 10 February 2026).

The draft STRLUS applies solutions to manage future growth within the region that appear to be based on a *management and control* approach, similar to the existing STRLUS:

- growth boundaries based on existing zoning regimes;
- interventions based on management of issues relevant to the urban Hobart area, and not the full range of settlements and networks across the region;
- an activity centre hierarchy based on existing service provision rather than strategic analysis of future needs, economics and aspirations of the local communities; and
- a growth control strategy rather than a range of enabling frameworks that reflect the many faces of the region with the greater Hobart area and economy, and the network of other settlements outside that area that serve lifestyle, agriculture, and tourism sectors.

The exhibited draft appears to set a strategic framework that will continue the status quo.

The lack of planning for future scenarios, combined with the universal use of restrictive nature of tools such as the growth boundaries across the region, will restrict the delivery of land for housing, increasing costs to end users, opportunity for land banking and speculative advantage/disadvantage and ultimately be counterproductive.

Many strategy statements appear to suggest that local planning should provide alternative use and development provisions to those in the State Planning Provisions for delivery of the required outcomes. This is inconsistent with the statutory tests for assessment of Local Provisions that set aside or vary the State Planning Provisions.

Recent decades have seen increased change and uncertainty in political, social, economic and environmental landscapes globally and locally. Good strategic planning for development is more important than ever.

A new STRLUS needs to enable response to global changes and projected and strategic growth over the next 25 years, enable flexible and timely responses to current and emerging issues and enable a future where Tasmania is something other than the projected large retirement village where the young and actively mobile leave.

The next STRLUS needs to establish:

- a clear process to enable aspirational growth, timely response to changing markets, conditions, technology, climate and environmental pressures and trends;

- enable /support strategic land use planning programs to be enacted by local government across the southern region, not focused on the greater Hobart area;
- clear priorities for the region that provide confidence for investment in land use and development;
- the evidence base for the interventions and priorities;
- a State-supported and led process to improve integration of land use planning and the strategic investment and delivery of infrastructure to improve the cost and delivery of land for housing and our communities within the region; and
- a process to deal with those matters or projects that arise that are outside the scope of the STRLUS development (either within the STRLUS or through an external process).

The State-based population profiles project Tasmania will effectively become a large retirement community, where the active and the young leave. This is not inevitable, rather it is a conscious choice that the draft STRLUS is likely to enable due to its structure and lack of long-term vision or strategy.

Delivery of revised regional land use strategies around Tasmania must be accompanied by increased funding for ongoing maintenance of the final document. Suitable operational budget allocations are required to deliver this commitment. This would prevent the stagnation that occurred with the existing STRLUS under previous Governments.

Maintenance of the STRLUS is now linked to the commitments established under the Tasmanian Planning Policies and the requirements for data and information they establish. The pending completion of the draft STRLUS raises many questions about who will deal with the aspirational elements of the Tasmanian Planning Policies when Councils are progressing planning scheme amendments through the Tasmanian Planning Commission. For example, strategies 3.2.2.1 c, d and e identify the management of impacts to regional biodiversity corridors, yet little data appears to be available to establish the base for these interventions. We are concerned that the obligations for delivery of the data and operational policy for these interventions will fall on Council if this is not delivered and maintained by the State.

Similarly, Regional Strategies for Cultural Heritage identify the protection, collaboration and mitigation of impacts to Aboriginal cultural heritage values and sites at section 3.6.2.1. These statements assume the required conversations, engagement and support has been achieved with the relevant agencies, groups and stakeholders by the State.

These types of obligations result from the Tasmanian Planning Policies. Absent completion of significant work by the State to ensure the support from the relevant stakeholders and the provision of the required data and frameworks for these interventions, this work is likely to fall on Council, the Local Government sector and developers when preparing and assessing planning scheme amendments and appearing before the Tasmanian Planning Commission. This is neither consistent with the intent nor the specific outcomes of the Schedule 1 Objectives.

Given the issues identified in this review, it is recommended that the current review forms a transitional document for the first stage of implementation of the Tasmanian Planning Policies.

The next 5 year period (2030) would be used to review application of the Tasmanian Planning Policies, develop a set of future scenarios, complete meaningful consultation and enable a full review of the STRLUS as part of the next 5-year review.

Following the discussion within this report and Position Paper, it is concluded that a comprehensive review STRLUS can be supported as a concept but the current proposal is premature and cannot be supported.

#### **About the Event and Organiser**

ECHO is a boutique cultural festival held over one immersive weekend on Tasmania's East Coast. The event brings together food, wine, live music, visual art, storytelling, and knowledge-sharing to celebrate harvest season and the region's distinctive coastal lifestyle. Through carefully curated, sensory experiences, ECHO fosters meaningful connection between audiences, place, and culture.

A central pillar of the program is the sharing of Tasmanian Aboriginal knowledge. This component strengthens cultural understanding, supports truth-telling, and deepens participants' connection to Country through respectful engagement with First Nations perspectives and stories.

ECHO was founded in 2019 by Tasmanian musician and creative producer Ange Boxall in response to a recognised gap in the regional cultural calendar. The festival was established to

amplify authentic East Coast narratives—its people, histories, landscapes, and creative voices—while providing high-quality cultural experiences in a regional setting.

International and interstate visitors stay an average of 14.5 nights in Tasmania, contributing to local accommodation providers, hospitality venues, fuel stations and retail businesses. While on-site camping is available, many attendees choose to stay in local accommodation within the Glamorgan Spring Bay Council (GSBC) area, further increasing local economic impact.

The event also promotes the East Coast of Tasmania through high-quality media assets captured during the event. These images and videos are shared across Spoke’s website and social media channels throughout the year, providing ongoing destination marketing exposure for the region.

### ***Local Participation and Volunteer Engagement***

Approximately 24% of event attendees are residents of the Glamorgan Spring Bay municipality. The event receives strong support from local volunteers, who play an integral role in event delivery. Volunteers consistently express appreciation for having a high-quality, nationally recognised event hosted within their local community.

Spoke is held at the pristine Mayfield Estate, showcasing the natural beauty of the region while maintaining a strong focus on environmental care, safety and community engagement.

A. DrumMUSTER are now introducing BagMUSTER. GSBC currently has DrumMUSTER at Swansea transfer station to recycle farm chemical containers, predominately from surrounding vineyards, this has been very successful to date.

BagMUSTER is a not-for-profit, industry-led initiative that offers a safe, eco-friendly solution for disposing of single-use polypropylene (PP) agricultural plastic bags. By participating, we contribute to reducing landfill waste and supporting the processing of bags into new products. Bag Muster will be located at Swansea Waste Transfer Station

### **Clr Gregson**

Q. Asked for clarification about which water tanks Council was filling for free in the Dolphin Sands area following the bushfire event?
