It was a pleasure during the last 3 months to preside over Citizenship Ceremonies. It is a privilege to be part of what can be a long process for people to make what I am sure is a life-changing decision. There is a report elsewhere in this edition of Seaspeak on this important occasion.

At the end of January, we celebrated the recipients of our Citizen of the Year and Community Volunteer. Nic Wardlaw was a very deserving winner of Citizen of the Year. The end of January was a busy time that included the resignation of Clr. Richard Parker that was accepted with regret. Clr. There were 3 eligible candidates from the 2022 election that indicated their willingness to be part of the recount. Council has entered a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the State Government to progress some important matters for our area. It is not specific to Glamorgan Spring

Bay Council but rather a broader focus across the Break O'Day and Glamorgan Spring Bay Council municipal areas that will benefit all of us and future generations. The tourism sector is a signatory to the MOU and will take a lead role in some areas. One unexpected but very welcome positive to come out of the MOU discussions was a commitment for public amenities to support the youth of Bicheno (the skatepark). Injured giant fish found on Dolphin Sands beach

his strange looking fish was found on

Nine Mile Beach at Dolphin Sands recently. The Ocean Sunfish is one of the largest bony fish in the world. Adults can weigh up to 1,000kgs. A sunfish caught in 1910 weighed an estimated 1,600kgs! Sunfish are considered a delicacy in some parts of the world. They are known to bask on the surface of the ocean, on their sides, presenting their large profiles to the sun. This activity puts them in direct conflict with marine craft, potentially causing damage to both craft and the fish. Sadly this juvenile, estimated at 100kgs, appeared to have wounds on its head that



may have been caused by a water craft.

Dear residents and ratepayers,
The new year started off with a bang!

The snap announcement in early February of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) by Government has resulted in some great news for the East Coast region. The MOU is a strategic partnership between the State Government, Glamorgan Spring Bay Council, Break'O Day Council, Tourism Industry Council, East Coast Tourism and Regional Development Australia.

Council is committed to its vision of having a network of accessible, convenient, safe, clean and well maintained toilets to enhance our public areas. To assist in achieving this vision we are about to undertake a Public Toilet Strategy. A Strategy informs the design, upgrade and maintenance of existing and new public toilet facilities.

We have recently completed an audit of the municipality toilets and the results of this audit will be incorporated into the strategy to guide recommendations and timing of upgrades.

On the next page of this publication you have the chance to take part in the public survey by scanning the QR code, alternatively you can visit Council's website to complete the survey. Hardcopy versions of this survey are available on request from the Council Office. This survey contains questions that are engaging and quick to answer so we strongly encourage you to participate.

After gathering community input, we will create a draft of the strategy, considering your feedback. This draft will be presented to the Council in May/June for approval, and we'll seek your input again. We expect to finalise the Public Toilet Strategy in September 2024. Once adopted, we'll be in a good position to secure external funds for toilet upgrades and development. In the meantime, we are committed to keeping our facilities clean and tidy.

The Tasmanian Emerging Community Leaders award ceremony took place at Parliament House on Valentines Day!

The Tasmanian Community Fund (TCF) recognises the value of developing leadership skills across the community that will enable them to help their community prosper. A Fund was provided by way of a grant through the Community Leadership Institute to enable the program to happen in conjunction with TCF.

Further development proposed is public amenities and car park.


Parks and Reserves



Council's reseal and pavement rehabilitation program is the main road project for Council at present with just over \$1M going to these works each year. ow is the time to check your property for the presence of Boneseed (Chrysanthemoides monilifera) and Spanish Heath (Erica lusitanica). Both these weeds are re-appearing in previously known areas.





Living with Snakes

The very thought of snakes fill some people with terror, whilst others are fascinated by these enigmatic creatures. Through the ages, humanity has been obsessed by snakes in myths, legends and superstitions. For example the northern Australian Aboriginal people believe that the creator of life was a giant snake, the Rainbow Serpent, which caused lightning and storm.

Sadly, snakes have been endlessly persecuted because of fear and superstition. Australians have often been guilty of killing snakes for no reason other than fearing them. It may come as a surprise to learn that snakes are not habitually aggressive and venom is used primarily to secure food and not as a defence. Only in the breeding season may they become territorial. Where humans are concerned, snakes are actually shy animals preferring to move away and hide or lie still in the hope of being overlooked. Their natural camouflage generally makes them inconspicuous.

Fortunately, attitudes are beginning to change and people are learning to respect these marvellous reptiles. So, before you reach for a stick, calmly assess the risks. You may even begin to admire them - certainly you should respect them.

Roles and Values

Like other natural predators snakes are important in regulating populations of their prey. Without such predators, prey species tend to overpopulate, leading to starvation and disease.

- Because Australia has few diurnal mammalian predators, birds and reptiles are very important. In Tasmania we do not have large goannas and therefore snakes are the most important reptile predators.
- Snakes are an important food source for a number of other animals such as birds of prey.
- Snakes eat introduced rodents and birds.

Snakes have other values. Many people enjoy watching them. Some populations, because of their long-term isolation, are excellent subjects for the study of evolution and competition. Like all native species they have a right to exist. Tasmania's snakes are protected by law in all state reserves.

Encountering Snakes

Snakes may be seen in the most surprising places (including cities) especially when water is in short supply. It is best to leave them alone or watch them from uphill. If they must be disturbed do it from a distance.

Although most will be just passing through, snakes do occasionally take up residence in suburban yards. During prolonged dry periods, they are attracted to gardens in search of water in rubbish, dog bowls, fishponds, swimming pools etc. Properties near scrubby creeks are especially prone to serpentine visits.

To minimise such presence in your garden keep:

- grass mown.
- garden debris to a minimum.



- wood heaps away from the house, and/or elevated 0.5m above ground level.
- under the house well sealed or very clear and dry.
- standing water and wet spots to a minimum.
- seal cracks in concrete which may shelter lizards.
 Rockeries are a major attraction for lizards.
- have a well maintained paling fence.

If you like snakes and want to encourage them it is easy to create an attractive habitat.

Dear Kate in Swansea - Exhibition

Penwarne Mitchell (1847 – 1878) currently showing at the East Coast Heritage Museum. The exhibition highlights the artistic legacy of the Mitchell family – the talents of Catherine Augusta Mitchell, her daughters Catherine Penwarne and Sarah Elizabeth, who lived on Tasmania's east coast in the 1860s.

Through their intricate drawings and paintings, the Mitchell sisters captured their adventures exploring wild forests and windswept coastlines with pets, picnics, boating and hunting featured in the visual stories they created.

At the heart of this exhibition is the remarkable respect and bond evident between Catherine Penwarne, or 'Dear Kate,' and her sister Sarah. Even after Kate's passing in 1878, Sarah with the support of their niece Grace Mitchell devoted nearly seven decades to preserving their shared artistic efforts. The resulting The Mitchell Scrapbook, chronicle the life-long work of these women, and remain a precious handmade treasure for all Tasmanians.

The *Dear Kate* exhibition was developed by Jane Giblin, a modern-day descendant of the extended Mitchell family and includes new works by Jane. These works breathe

new life into Kate's drawings, revealing the fascinating stories and timeless spirit of the Mitchell women.

Whist the exhibition is in Swansea, Jane will hold workshops in March and April aimed at gathering writing and imagery based on family stories.
