Open Space Strategy and Walking and Cycling Strategy

Glamorgan Spring Bay Council is developing a strategy that will provide strategic direction about the planning for open space, walking and cycling across the municipality.

An Open Space Strategy is a plan that will guide the planning, development, management, and enhancement of open spaces in the community. It will serve as a roadmap for the Council and the community to identify gaps in open space provision, plan for the creation of new and needed open spaces and improve the effectiveness and usage of existing open spaces.

The Walking and Cycling Strategy will consider the existing walking and cycling infrastructure and programs within the community and assess gaps and identify opportunities to support a more active community.

Opportunities for community members to provide input into both projects will be available in the coming months and further details and updates will follow as the projects develop.

Message from the Mayor

Welcome to the Summer Edition of Seaspeak
This year seems to have flown by! I cannot believe how fast Christmas is approaching.

Council in 2024 has been very busy for everyone. Every year we seem to kick more and more goals because of our incredible staff. We recognise that we don't always meet the expectations of the community due to various factors, but overall, we have had a successful year.

Supporting our community groups is high on Council's list each year. Earlier this year, a community member came to see me about establishing a community food hub as they were aware of rising food insecurity numbers in the Triabunna/Orford area. The Spring Bay Community Hub has been established in Triabunna as the outcome of a vision developed by a group of community volunteers. This vision was to provide affordable food hampers to anyone in the municipality.. The group and the service has grown very quickly and in the 3 months since opening have expanded their range.

Through our Community Small Grants and Events Grants program we have supported a range of groups and events in 2024. One issue that comes across our desk on a regular basis is the cost of public liability insurance. It is an expensive hurdle for any community group whether they are an established group or a start-up like the community food hub. Some grant recipients are accessing the program to cover their insurance costs. Successful grants recipients to date in this financial year include:

2nd Rates Installment Due – Friday 29 November 2024

Just a reminder: the second installment of your rates for the 2024/2025 year is due on Friday, 29 November 2024.

To make payments easier, you can set up regular direct debit payments, forms can be downloaded from our website or contact council to have one sent out, pay online via BPAY, or in person at your local council office.

Pension Remission:

If you're eligible for pension remission, please apply before 31st March 2025.

To qualify, you must:

 You must be liable to pay the rates on the property for which you are claiming the remission, and it must be your principal place of residence.

- Hold a Pensioner Concession Card (PCC), Health Care Card (HCC), or a Veterans Affairs Gold Card (TPI or War Widow endorsed).
- The card must have been issued on or before 1 July this year.

If you received a remission last year, it should be applied automatically. New applicants or changes in ownership will need to apply.

Ensure your payment is made on time to avoid late fees. If you're facing financial difficulty, contact the council to discuss support options.



From the General Manager's desk

Summer on the East Coast, how enticing. We have the extraordinary good fortune to enjoy this marvellous corner of our planet and share it with neighbours, visitors and the unique and diverse flora and fauna endemic to the region. It is the hope of all at council that the summer season is an enjoyable time where all risks are adequately managed to ensure our individual and collective impacts on our environments are limited and manageable.

To help where things go awry, we rely heavily on volunteers associated with fire, ambulance, surf lifesaving and marine rescue, SES, and to a lesser but still important extent, teams managing and minimising weed growth in reserves to reduce fire hazards.

Works Report

Infrastructure

Tis' the season for road maintenance and the annual pavement rehabilitation and resealing program should be almost complete by now. A major expense for our council is this annual program which targets the worst sections of road for renewal each year, progressively working across the municipal road system to ensure the overall road condition is not declining.

Stormwater improvement works have included the improvements to Bluff Court at Spring Beach where long standing stormwater issues have been resolved with the installation of kerb and channel.



Coles Bay Hall Annex project is progressing well with inground plumbing complete, slab down and framing well advanced. This exciting project is due for completion over the summer.



And what good is a building if those hidden facilities we all rely on aren't adequate? Not just a bark garden, under this unassuming exterior lies a new waste water treatment arrangement which replaces the disappointing raised beds, which have given community and council concern since their installation.



These facilities significantly improve the hall usability and level of service provided to the community.



Council is progressing with the water tank program in the Swansea and Dolphin Sands localities funded by the Black Summer grant program. 31 properties have taken the opportunity to improve their fire fighting capability with dedicated firefighting water tank installations. These are programmed to be complete by the end of Summer.

Caring for pets in an Emergency

Emergency planning for pets is an important part of emergency household preparations and greatly increases the likelihood of evacuating your poets to safety. There are many things pet owners can do to be prepared in the event of emergencies such as flood or bushfires.

Where can I have my dog off-lead?

All Councils are required to develop a Dog Management Policy in accordance with the *Dog Control Act 2000*. This Policy outlines where you can have your dogs off lead. Council's current Dog Management Policy is under review and community consultation on the new draft will begin shortly.


The current Policy is available on Council's website by searching "Dog Management Policy 2014-2019" Council has signage installed in these areas to let you know if your dog can be on or off-lead or your dog may even be prohibited, you must obey this signage.

In certain public areas your dog must be on a lead at all times these include:

- Pedestrian Walking Tracks
- Roads

- Footpaths
- Cycleways

Please remember that you must still have control of your dog in an off-lead area. Your dog must be close to you and in your sight at all times. Your dog must be able to respond to your commands. For example, if you call your dog to come back to you it should come back. If your dog isn't good with responding to your commands, then it should stay on a lead.



Maintaining your septic tank for a healthy environment!

Regular checks and maintenance can prevent leaks and contamination, protecting our precious water sources and ecosystems.

If your property isn't serviced by TasWater sewer mains, you likely use an onsite waste-water management system (OWMS). For the OWMS to work effectively and avoid environmental harm or health risks, it needs regular maintenance. This ensures it treats wastewater properly and helps you avoid costly repairs or replacements.

Maintaining an OWMS is not only good for the environment, but a mandatory responsibility of property owners under the *Building Act 2016*.

Staying Safe Around Swimming Pools & Spas/Hot Tubs

We are nearing Summer and hopefully the warm weather too, lets talk about backyard swimming pools and your responsibilities.

Pool, Spa & Hot Tub owners have a legal responsibility to install a safety barrier (fencing) if your swimming pool or spa holds a depth of water of 300mm (30cm) or more.

This includes:

- In-ground, indoor (excluding bathroom spa baths), above ground, inflatable & relocatable pools.
- Wading pools holding 300mm (30cm) of water.
- Hot tubs, spas.

An owner may install the pool only after a safety barrier is

installed and certified by a licensed building surveyor.

In Tasmania, installation of pool safety barriers must be performed by a licensed builder and overseen by a licensed building surveyor.

Triabunna is not only the gateway to Maria Island – it is home to a collection of local reserves that embody the region's rich natural heritage. From native forests to coastal heathlands and wetlands, these reserves provide habitat for a wide range of species, some of which, are found nowhere else on earth. The birdlife alone is extraordinary, with vibrant species like the endangered swift parrot, and the beautiful eastern rosella frequently spotted.

The Ecological Importance of Our Reserves

As we witness changes in our environment due to climate change and other environmental pressures, the role of these reserves becomes even more important in ensuring the resilience of both the local wildlife and the community. Their continued protection is crucial, not only for the wildlife that inhabits them but for the future wellbeing of all our community.


Tasmanian sea lavender
(Limonium australe var. baudinii) is a short-lived perennial herb endemic to southeastern Tasmania. The species is listed



as Vulnerable with fewer than 1,500 mature plants remaining, most of which are in Triabunna.

Albert Morris's Telescope

Albert Morris took over the running of the Swansea General Store from his father, James Morris, in 1899. From the top storey of his impressive three-storey store in Swansea, he oversaw the safety and efficiency of his business operations with the help of his trusty telescope.

A telescope is not a usual management tool today. However, in the late 1800s, transport to farms on the east coast of Tasmania still relied on the sea and occasionally the beach. Only a coach road connected the region south to Hobart and an dirt road linked Swansea to Campbell Town and then further north via the "Old Coach Road" to Avoca.

Since the turn of the century, the Morris Store had been expanding its services to the towns of Little Swanport, Bicheno, and Coles Bay, which had sizeable populations of miners and trappers. Grocery deliveries to these areas were made using a horse and cart. As there were no roads, deliveries to Coles Bay involved driving the cart along

Nine Mile Beach; if the tides were favourable, the horses could be led through the shallow Swan River. If the tide was unsuitable, goods were ferried across in small boats.

The younger family members responsible for making these home deliveries tended to rush their tasks. Albert Morris strictly maintained standards and insisted on checking the horses upon their return. To prevent the delivery drivers from racing on the beach and cooling the horses in the surf on the way back, he would watch them using a telescope from the store's top floor. He was always prepared to take appropriate action if he discovered the horses had been driven too hard.

Albert Morris's telescope is part of the Morris Collection, a treasure trove of family history, past stock items, images, and shop fittings generously donated to the East Coast Heritage Museum.



The Morris General Store – a family legacy exhibition will be have an official launch in January 2025 and can be

viewed at the East Coast Heritage Museum in Swansea.

Albert Morris's telescope was manufactured between 1856 and 1858. It is made of wood (oak), brass, and glass lenses and is about 80cm long (about the length of a cricket bat) when extended. The telescope is marked as 'Improved' which means it has a tapering barrel. This style of telescope was easy to use, allowing for a more stable grip. Because of its long length, the telescope provided good, stable magnification for general use.

The telescope was made by Somalvico, a large family of English instrument makers whose craftsmanship was always of the highest standard. The Somalvico family traded 1820–1901 in London, England — the Telescope used by Albert Morris was made by Vincent Somalvico.
